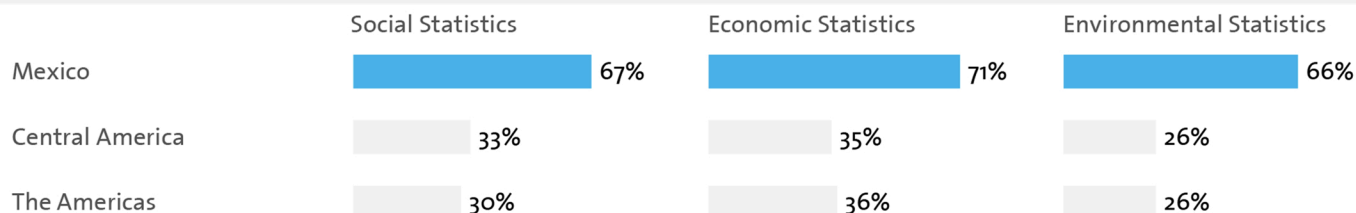

SUMMARY

Mexico ranks 1st in the Open Data Inventory with a total score of 68/100. The total score is a combination of a data coverage subscore of 61/100 and a data openness subscore of 74/100.

Mexico scores higher than the regional median across all three major data categories. Within the country, the highest levels of coverage and openness are on economic statistics and the lowest levels are on environmental statistics.

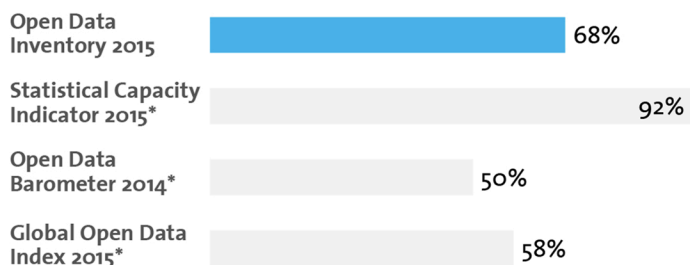
Looking across all 20 data categories, Mexico provides the best coverage on, but not limited to: National Accounts and International Trade, and the least coverage on, but not limited to: Education Facilities and Education Outcomes.

In terms of openness, Mexico receives the highest scores on, but not limited to: Health Facilities and Health Outcomes, and the lowest scores on: International Trade and Gender Statistics.
